COLORADO COMMUNITY OF PRACTICE

Big Picture Learning works hand-in-hand with educators, schools and communities to facilitate student-interest-driven, real-world learning. One of the ways we accomplish this is through **Communities of Practice** (CoPs). Some CoPs focus on specific problems of practice, while others are inspired by the needs and desires articulated by school partners. CoPs foci may include coaching, school visits and collaborative professional development – as well as access to shared resources like BPL’s internship management platform [ImBlaze](#) – all aimed at helping schools move toward more student-driven practices and achieving more equitable outcomes for all young people.

BPL is currently working with Communities of Practice in California, New York, Texas and Washington, as well as in Colorado, to which we’re excited to draw sharper focus.

The Colorado Community of Practice has expanded rapidly, growing from three to nine schools across the state within the last two years. This growth continues to thrive with the guidance and support of BPL staff, along with the advice and learned experiences of local school leaders who have already adopted the BPL design principles in their own schools. When the Colorado CoP officially launched in 2022, it included an effort to bring together school leaders both within and beyond Colorado who are exploring the BPL design.

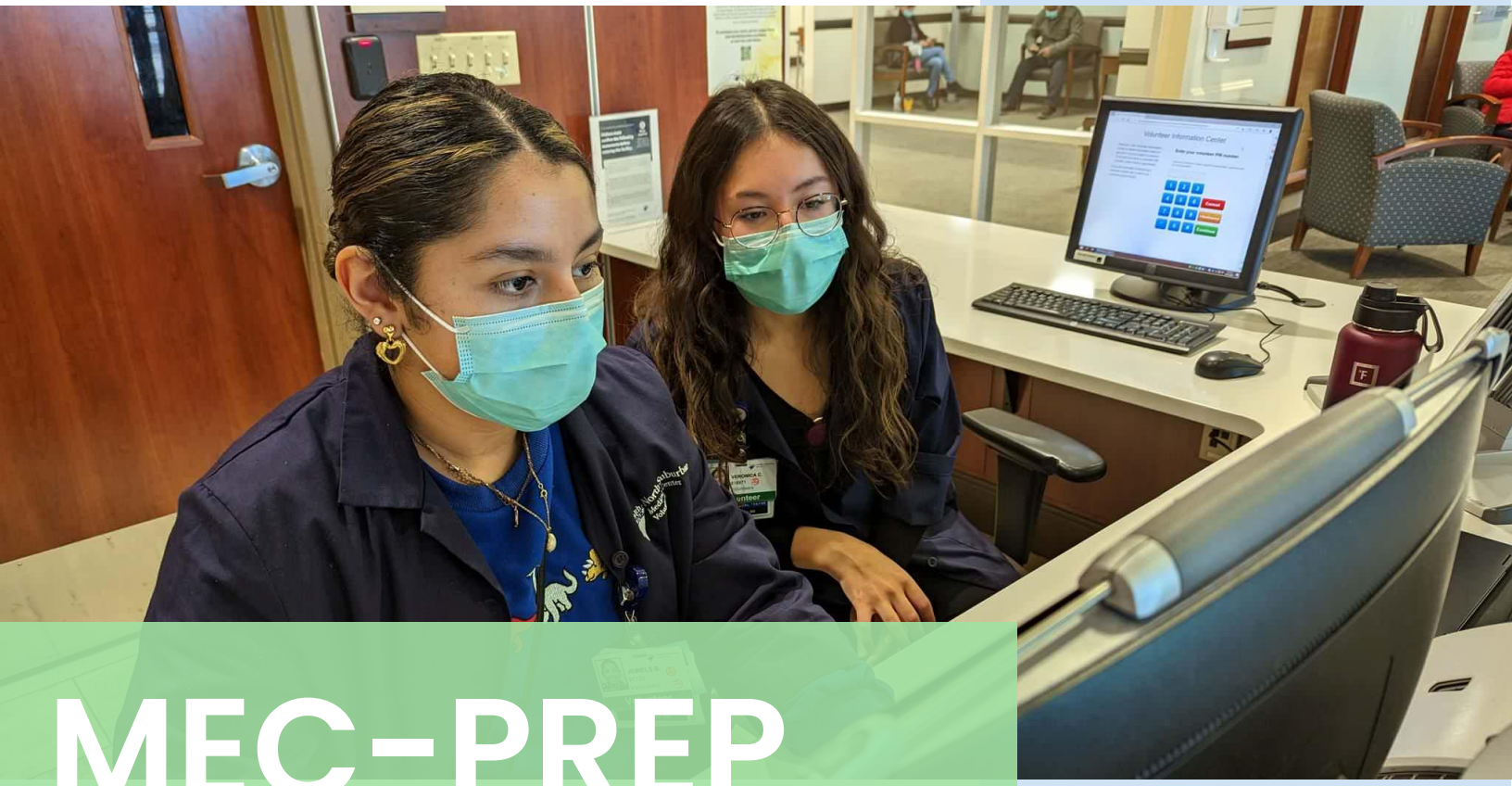
The diversity of students represented in the schools – including teen parents, young people who recently immigrated to the United States, English language learners, students from military families and more – greatly influences how each school approaches individualized student learning, which has been a focus of their – and our – shared work.

MEC-PREP

Mapleton Early Career Preparatory High School (Thornton, CO), founded in 2005, serves more than 300 students in grades 9-12.

According to a recent survey, 84% of students reported feeling that they have opportunities to succeed at MEC-Prep and 80% reflected that learning is important at their school.

Two standout programs – MEC-Prep’s **Internship Program** and **School-Based Business Initiative** – have made it one of the more sought-after high schools in the Mapleton District, often with a waitlist of eager students. Since bringing on a dedicated internship coordinator in 2021, MEC-Prep’s Internship Program has grown rapidly, offering a wide and increasing variety of exciting opportunities for students. According to data compiled through ImBlaze, BPL’s Internship Management platform adopted by MEC-Prep and a number of other

schools nationwide, students have completed over 16,400 internship hours in the greater Mapleton/Denver community. These internships span multiple sectors, including: welding, auto mechanics, medicine, journalism, graphic design, law enforcement, veterinary care, food services, and more.

MEC-Prep’s School-Based Business Initiative funds materials for student projects and *Leaving to Learn* opportunities, including a student-run screen printing business. A dedicated student leadership committee helps determine how funds are used, supporting projects that, over the past year, have included flight lessons, robotics materials, music production equipment, graphic design hardware, steel-toed shoes for industrial internships and much more.

MEC’s community culture has proven to be its secret sauce. At a time when teacher dissatisfaction is rising nationwide, surveys suggest that MEC teachers **love their school**.

NEW LEGACY

As it approaches its 10th anniversary, [New Legacy Charter School](#) (Aurora, CO) remains proud to primarily serve pregnant and parenting teens and their children, maintaining a fierce commitment to innovation and equity. New Legacy's highly rated Early Learning Center provides a nurturing and loving environment for the children of its students, using a two-generation educational model.

Over the past decade, the New Legacy community has reached several important milestones that have helped define its identity and mission. In 2019, the school joined the BPL Network; and in 2020 – despite the challenges of remote and hybrid learning – the school successfully launched its advisory program, which has since remained a cornerstone of its student-centered approach to teaching and learning.

New Legacy's growth has continued steadily in the years that have

followed. In 2021-22, the school introduced an internship program, partly supported by a grant made possible through the Governor's [RISE](#) funding, offering students valuable real-world experiences. In 2022-23, New Legacy began piloting a competency-based diploma system – the first in Colorado to do so – moving away from conventional credits in favor of more personalized and meaningful assessments.

The 2023-24 academic year saw the school's first [Harbor Freight Fellow](#), and in 2024-25, New Legacy proudly celebrated its first [ASCENT](#) program graduate, which allows students to accumulate a year's worth of college credit at no additional cost.

A research team led by CU Boulder Professor Elena Díaz Billelo recently launched a two-year study on the school's impact on students and graduates, with findings expected to be published by the end of the 2025-26 academic year.

THE NUMBERS AND THE NEEDS

New Legacy's 2024 graduation rate was **74%** overall and **75%** among teen parents, which is 50% higher than the national average for teen mothers.

New Legacy's Early Learning Center – serving the babies and infants of its parenting population – has received the second highest designation provided by Colorado Shines, placing it in the **top 15%** of ELCs in the state.

During the 2023-2024 school year, **88%** of ELC students met or exceeded age-appropriate development and school readiness milestones.

33% of New Legacy's students had previously dropped out of high school. // **35%** were considered unhoused in the last year. // **6%** have been part of Colorado's foster care system.

In response to the question “How does the BPL design work?” our preferred response is: “Here, let us show you!” After all, what better way to explain real-world learning than by experiencing it firsthand?

During the 2023–2024 academic year, BPL launched the **Guided Experience** – a two-day immersive visit hosted by our most seasoned network schools. These visits provide an opportunity for school leaders and educators from across the country to share time and space, not only with the leaders, teachers and – of course – students from the host school; but also with fellow visitors who are grappling with similar challenges and exploring new solutions.

Though condensed into a short time frame, the BPL Guided Experience explicitly embraces the core design elements of a BPL network school. A key component of the two-day experience is *Leaving to Learn* in the host community by shadowing students during their interest-based internship days.

The visitors themselves model another essential element of the Big Picture approach by forming an Advisory. Visitors not only learn from and with one another, but are also encouraged to remain in contact and continue conversations after returning to their home communities.

The 2023–24 Guided Experiences were so popular that BPL doubled the number of school visits for the current academic year, and even planned Guided Experiences focused on topics such as: BPL in middle and elementary schools, serving teen parenting populations, Indigenous populations and more.

In the past year, the Big Picture Learning national network of schools has grown significantly! We are thrilled to celebrate all of the new schools that we have welcomed into our national community of committed educators and leaders who champion student-driven, equity-focused, real-world education. No two Big Picture schools are the same, but all are united by our shared mission of supporting young people in living lives of their own design.

Some schools join the Big Picture Learning network with aspirations for transformation, while others – including several of our new schools – launch from scratch, using Big Picture Learning’s distinguishers as the foundation of their own design principles. We support this through our **The Year Before Opening (TYBO)** program – a fellowship in which leaders work with our School Leadership and Innovation team to engage their communities in designing and launching their own brand new Big Picture Learning schools.

Among these schools is **University High** – located on the University of Tennessee Chattanooga campus. This strong partnership between UTC and Hamilton County Schools – solidified with the school’s opening in 2023 – allows students to immerse themselves in college-level courses taught by UTC faculty, while also receiving support from high school teachers on campus.

One of the ways students engage in real-world learning at University High is through “Focus Fridays.” Initially, they explore UTC’s four major colleges, visiting the athletic training lab, the Rollins College of Business, and even WUTC – the campus radio station. Students then choose their own “Focus Friday” experiences, including job shadowing opportunities that align with their interests and passions. By senior year, these experiences can evolve into real-world internships – both on and off campus – in career fields that students want to explore more deeply.

After two years in the program, University High students – many of whom will be first-generation college graduates – will earn 12 to 20 college credits hours.
